Beowulf – epic Anglo-Saxon poem, over 3000 lines long in Old English, about a Swedish warrior who slaughtered the beast Grendel and its mother AD / CE Anno Domini – Used with a date to show how many years since the birth of Christ. Eq: it is now 2019 AD. AD is sometimes replaced by CE which stands for Common Era. **Primary sources of Evidence** Evidence created during the time being studied by the people of that time Secondary sources of evidence Evidence created by other people based on primary evidence **Settlement** A place where people make their homes **Evidence** Proof of something Artefact A historical object Paganism The religion of the Anglo-Saxons who believed in many gods **Christianity** The religion of the Romans, based on the teachings of Jesus and belief in one God. **Conversion** change

Wergild Wergild was a payment system used in Anglo-Saxon times to settle disputes between the criminal and the victim or the victim's family Runes The letters used in the Runic alphabet. This is how the Anglo Saxons wrote.


